ST AIDAN'S WARDENS REPORT

This is our final Warden's report with both James and Desre stepping down from our respective roles at this AGM. Thank you to everyone for the support you have provided as we have sought to discharge our duties to the best of our abilities.

Looking back at Warden's Reports of recent years there has been a regular theme of change and 2024 has proven, once again, that change is the one constant.

From a physical building perspective we welcomed change at the start of the year with the delivery of our new gathering area kitchen and unisex hall toilets. The delivery of this project once again highlighted the way in which the St Aidan's parish comes together whether it is through the giving of financial resources or the provision of hours of volunteer time. The combination of which is so critical to achieving so much in relation to our Church life.

Change continued in February with Kerry announcing his resignation in order to take up the vicar's role in the parish of Altona in Melbourne. On 7 May we farewelled Kerry and Vaoa who had both contributed so much to St Aidan's during a stay that, as they acknowledged, was much shorter than they had anticipated.

The third significant change came with Louise announcing her intention to retire in early 2025. Louise's decision to make her retirement plans known so far in advance provided us with the opportunity to pursue a managed transition of the Church leadership. As Wardens we are very grateful for Louise's selfless decision to enable this approach to be taken. We do also wish to take this opportunity to acknowledge the additional workload Louise has borne in leading the Church since May without the support of a Priest Associate.

Next month we will welcome Sarah Stevens-Cross as our new Vicar, which will be a time of celebration as we look forward with positivity and hope. For now, we wish to thank the Nomination Committee, particularly our Parish representatives, Juli Mercer, Izzi Hoskyn, and James Parkinson for their considered discernment that ultimately resulted in Sarah's appointment.

We extend our thanks to all staff that have contributed so much through the course of the year frequently going well beyond their job description to do whatever is required. To Anne, Izzi, Isobell, Nick, David, and Hannah, thank you.

Vestry has operated very effectively over the last year benefitting from an experienced Vestry team. There has been a good spread of experience, expertise, and perspectives that has been brought together for the benefit of our Parish. Our thanks to Vestry as a whole for the hours you have committed and the way in which you have prioritised Church matters to enable us to make considered decisions in a timely manner whether at our monthly meetings or via email, as required.

David Jamieson needs to be acknowledged for his nine consecutive years on Vestry as Synod representative. This year sees Julie Barnes and James Parkinson stepping down from Vestry after many years of service and thanks go to both for their contribution. Looking forward, it is important that Vestry continues to attract a diverse range of parishioners that are willing and able to actively contribute at meetings and in the delivery of a wide range of projects and initiatives.

Finally, we wish to acknowledge the tireless efforts of so many volunteers that contribute to St Aidan's, whether it be as part of regular activities or more specific projects. Your dedication makes so much possible.

We look forward to 2025 with much anticipation. May God bless each and every one of you.

DEACON ASSISTANT

Period of Time: Feb - Nov 2024

I began life as a <u>newly ordained</u> deacon in the Parish of St Aidan's in February of this year. This was for me a notable change in terms of my own life and journey of faith. Standing 'on my own' and apart from those with whom I had journeyed for many years taking some adjustment. This adjustment has been aided by the people and clergy of St Aidan's who live into the fullness of their relationship with God in a very clear and intentional way, seeking to be a community of <u>worship</u> – celebrating God's love; <u>caring</u> – being God's love for one another, and <u>mission</u> – taking God's love into the world. I am truly grateful for the kindness and support I have received as I have sought to learn how I too might live into this vision as an ordained person.

The gift of a stole from the Saint Aidan's community to mark the beginning of ordained ministry was most warmly received. This stole has been worn every Sunday during ordinary time and continues to remind me that in and through the ordinariness of life God continues to work in our lives. It was not long after I arrived that preparations for Easter Worship Services began. I was, alongside Kate Shrigley and Kathleen Pullen – a student from the UK, invited to lead one of three services during Holy Week. Participation in this week allowed for creative, interactive, and integrative services – and these were a joy to be part of. Pancakes on Shrove Tuesday was a first for me – and it was a wonderful opportunity to meet and to eat some delicious food alongside a few parishioners. This was not to be my last opportunity to gather and to dine alongside parishioners – the Matariki Breakfast, the parish picnic, and the St Aidan's Day lunch later in the year also created some lasting memories for me.

Being a very active and intentional parish St Aidan's always seems to be 'on the move' - there is always something on just around the corner. And so, it wasn't long before the next event, so to speak, was in the making. In the lead up to Kerry and Vaoa's farewell and their goodbye I gained some insight into the strength of the relationships and history within a parish that creates a sense of belonging in terms of its worship, care, and outreach. This was highlighted once again at the New Comers lunch, where parishioners spoke on the many varied ways that St Aidans expresses itself including in worship services, retirement village services, ASTA, a pins and needles group, mission shop, Mainly Music, prison and hospital ministry, prayer meetings, AAW, WEF, Choir, Men's ministry, pastoral care and small groups. It has been a real blessing to be a part of some of these ministries this year and I have been

encouraged by the many faithful people in the parish who contribute to the life of the parish in so many different ways.

Another highlight for me this year has been connecting with those 'beyond the walls of St Aidans'. There has been Mainly Music on a Wednesday alongside Dave Finn and then Hannah Scharf – with singing and dancing, and meeting with people over a cuppa. So too, I have very much enjoyed being a part of the ministry to Retirement Villages including Waimarie, 7 Saint Vincents, and Rawhiti. And then of course there was the quiz night and the garage sale. Both these events demonstrating St Aidan's ability to connect with the wider community to benefit a wider cause.

So too, I have been able to gather alongside the <u>pastoral care team</u> once a month to see how the people of St Aidan's show genuine care and concern for one another in the provision of freezer meals, prayer, and connecting with one another. I have enjoyed being a part of the prayer group that meets every Thursday morning, and I have enjoyed meeting up with parishioners on a one-to-one basis - I am grateful to those who have shared their knowledge, wisdom, stories, and memories with me.

As I reflect upon the year that has been and begin to prepare for ordained ministry as a priest, I would also like to give thanks for Louise and for the ministry she has offered to me. As part of my placement, I have benefitted greatly from her support and guidance. She has offered wisdom, counsel, and advice on various aspects of ministry and for this I am very thankful.

I am grateful to be continuing my ministry at St Aidan's and look forward to the year that lies ahead.

PASTORAL CARE

A dedicated team of parishioners continue to meet regularly to support and pray for those in our congregation for whom we know, are in need.

Many thanks to the Prayer Circle group, led by Karel Lees, they pray privately for those in need, who have informed Karel of their prayer requirements.

Our Parish Grapevine continues to be lead by our dedicated group of "Callers", who each have a group of folk they call about four times a year. It is a chance to chat to someone who they may not chat or see regularly in Church, while also keeping up to date with any changes occurring in the parishioners lives. (e.g. Change of address, or personal needs, which can be passed on, if the person so wishes). I would like to thank all our Callers, who willingly keep this Grapevine alive!

Pastoral care also offers prayer ministry on a Sunday after the service, in the side Chapel, where someone will meet to pray with you about your concerns. This is also a confidential opportunity to "share the load" or just give grateful thanks to our God.

We have a supply of frozen meals in our deep freeze, for those in need. Be it a short term need recovering from ill health, or maybe just someone who comes to the office in need of a meal. Thank you to our team of dedicated ladies, who provide the meals.

Another large proportion of Pastoral care is delivered by our Clergy, who offer regular services at the retirement villages, that fall under St. Aidan's parish. The clergy are assisted by a dedicated small group of helpers, which enables them to have a monthly service the following retirement villages - 7 St Vincent's, Remuera Gardens, Rawhiti, and more recently, Waimarie. We also have a "coffee catch up" with our parishioners, who live at Ed. Hillary, and at Meadowbank Oceania.

All the abovementioned activities are under the leadership of our Vicar, Louise Anderson. We would like to give grateful thanks to her, for her dedicated caring and support for this group, as well as those they visit. We wish Louise happiness and good health in her retirement. May she continue to be a blessing in her new community.

MISSIONS & OUTREACH

Auckland City Mission

Our support of the City Mission's Food Bank is an ongoing part of Parish life. Parishioners' donations of non perishable food items are collected on Sundays and are blessed at each of our Church Services.

Parishioners also responded generously to our traditional Winter Appeal over a period of four weeks when we aim to boost donations of items in short supply on the Mission's Food Bank shelves.

It was important for us to view, as a Parish, an interview between Bishop Ross and the City Missioner, Helen Robinson, which highlighted the struggles faced by low income families and individuals for whom food insecurity is a daily fact of life.

In the light of this message, we were delighted that the decision had been made to choose the Food Bank as the recipient of the proceeds from our Parish Annual Quiz night in August. A total of \$ 2070 was raised at this fun event.

Auckland Angels

It is hoped that, in the lead up to Christmas, we can once again give parishioners an opportunity to participate in the Mission's Auckland Angels programme. As Christmas Angels, we can donate new toys, books and other items which will be given as gifts to children who otherwise will go without.

Habitat for Humanity

The Parish values its support of the Habitat for Humanity Curtain Bank project as St Aidan's continues to act as a drop off point for used, full length curtains.

The Curtain Bank is engaged in cutting, sewing, and repurposing these donated curtains. Last year around 5500 curtains were installed enabling families and individuals to have warmer, healthier homes and thereby contributing to a reduction in energy bills.

Charitable Purposes Group

The Charitable Purposes Group will meet at the end of November so that a recommendation can be made to Vestry for an appropriate distribution of the year's income from the Parish Mission Shop. It is hoped that we can continue to support the same agencies as in previous years and in addition make a significant increase in our giving to the City Mission's Food Bank.

Previous recipients of donations were: NZCMS, Anglican Board of Mission, Anglican Trust for Women and Children, Christians against Poverty, Prison Chaplaincy Aotearoa NZ, Interchurch Council for Hospital Chaplaincy, Prisoners Aid and Rehabilitation Services.

The dedicated team of volunteers in the Mission Shop, led by Jenny Haggitt, make possible these outreach donations from our Parish.

Prison Ministry

Women at Wiri continue to benefit from the ministry which St Aidan's provides.

The two teams alternate on the fourth Sunday of each month. Hein and I go together. It is unusual for a man to offer ministry at Wiri, but we have been told that this is beneficial as it is good for the women to see a husband and wife team (see a positive male influence).

The Spiritual input is well received by those attending, and the Chaplains at Wiri have reported that ladies are much calmer after 'Prison ministry'.

Sometimes we are fortunate to have the designated 'Spiritual Space'. This area is used by all faiths, hence the name. The environment is more relaxed here, as it is frequented by the women who are living in units and not cells. At other times we visit the 'Mothers and Babies Hub'. This is always rewarding as it is a unique area of ministry, often one on one.

Other times again we enter the 'High risk' area, where one has to be very vigilant. We always offer prayer, no matter where we are ministering.

Long may this ministry continue!

To date our total is \$15,775. We will meet in November to distribute the proceeds to our various charities. Our heartfelt thanks go to Louise for her help, guidance and support over the years.

YOUTH

It has been a mixed year for youth. The youth group has decreased in size slightly, with somewhere between 6 – 8 regulars. The main difference in this year to previous years is that the number of youths attending each week has gone down, affecting both Friday night and Sunday morning programmes. The main reason for this is due to many of the youth having other commitments throughout the year. This has meant that it has been challenging to get most or all of the youth in one place on a regular basis in order to try and build on the community that has been so strong over the past few years. The affect has been felt more on Friday nights, which has resulted in us pausing our regular programme and instead have one-off social events during the year. We also hosted a Youth Group open day in May, which allowed youth from around the community to come along and see what we are all about.

Even though numbers may be down, our Sunday morning programme has continued as normal, looking at the same themes as the congregation week to week. This was a deliberate change from previous years in order to create some continuity for them as they would be able to discuss the same theme/topic with their families and has also allowed for easier collaborations with Kid's Church as it now means we are both looking at the same topic each week. Speaking of Kid's Church, it has been great to be able to do more combined sessions this year (even if that has been mainly due to myself or Izzi being away or sick). This has allowed the youth to interact with the kids more, allowed for relationships to be built, and with some of the kids nearly at youth group age it is great to have this connection so that its' not so weird moving from Kids' Church to Youth Group.

At the start of this year, we were able to come up with what we consider to be the core values of our youth group at St Aidan's. In the past few years, we have started by creating a treaty (or rules) for the year that everyone agrees to. By creating these values it allows us to show the wider community what the youth group aims to be and doesn't need to be redone at the beginning of each year. The values that we came up with are Community, Acceptance, Leadership, and Manaakitanga, creating the acronym CALM.

The youth continue to be great contributors to parish events, with many of them helping out on St Aidan's Day, the Garage Sale, and other events during the year, which has led to me receiving some positive comments from visitors who have been impressed at how the youth get involved. It is really encouraging to see their willingness to be a part of these events and allows

them to interact with the St Aidan's community outside of normal settings and showing them, they are valued members of the parish community.

We have once again been fully involved with Anglican Youth Ministries (AYM) events during the year. This has included the annual Easter camp, E-Fest, and worship nights. At the time of writing this report, we are only a few days away from hosting the final worship night for the year at St Aidan's. By attending these events it allows the youth to build relationships across the diocese and the potential for some combined youth sessions with other youth groups in the future.

Personally, this year, I have been able to complete some training around suicide awareness, while looking to refresh my first aid and boundaries training early next year. I was also able to head down to Waikanae to attend The Abbey, the annual national youth conference. This was a chance to attend workshops on various topic's such as Making Welcoming Spaces and Neurodiversity, which has challenged me and helped my planning in the youth space.

I am continuing to look at ways to grow this ministry and make a space that allows the youth of our church to deepen and explore their faith and what it means to them. I have already started planning for 2025 and hope that it will be a year of growth and adventure for all involved.

MAINLY MUSIC

Mainly Music at St Aidan's has seen a few changes in staff throughout 2024. First welcoming David Finn who took over from Vaoa and then myself as Coordinators, the knowledge and experience was kindly able to be passed along with each change. David's experience as a teacher, counselor and parent himself was helpful for building relationships with the families and creating an overall familiar atmosphere during the sessions. Thus, we had very loyal attendees whose feedback was overall very positive.

For Easter, David took the children into the Church to visit the tomb display and watch a short video about the significance of Easter. This was followed by an easter egg hunt and little gift bags for each child to take home.

The wonderfully thought-out Mother's Day session was unfortunately very sparsely visited, but well received, nonetheless. There was a colourful corner to take polaroid pictures together, some special decorations and a curated selection of songs as well as some homemade cookies.

I took over as a Co-ordinator in June. I've continuously been introducing more reworked songs into the song database, as well as new probs. For Father's Day we prepared decorations, a DIY for each family to take part in as well as a baking mix to prepare and enjoy together at home. We tried hard to remind everyone to bring male family members to celebrate them and had a wonderful turnout of fathers and grandfathers.

Overall, there has been a decline in attendance in 2024. Whereas in the beginning of the year up to 10 families would come to a session, 9 months later we barely ever have more than 5 families present. This might be a sign of the times, due to increased funding for childcare or other factors. We've had to say goodbye to several children moving on to full time daycare, most of them at the age of 2 ½. Also, a few mothers with advanced pregnancies stopped coming along. Lastly, there have been a few families moving away from the area choosing to look for more local opportunities to connect.

We've also created a poster that was hung up around public places in the neighbourhood to spread the word.

There have been a handful of new families coming along, just very few on a regular basis, though. However, those who do stick around actually enjoy the small size of our current group, as it gives some of the more introverted children a space to enjoy themselves.

We've had many caretakers voice their relief in feeling that our mainly music

sessions are a place to enjoy interactions with their children; a relaxed, fun environment. Specifically, the high engagement of the selection of songs and having morning tea available for parents to mingle while the children engage in some free play have been pointed out as a favourite.

All in all, even though we've experienced low numbers, everyone who does come is enjoying their time. We're hoping that new families will continue to join us so we can extend our community.

We are looking forward to the rest of the year, specifically the Christmas session in December and will continue to extend our warmest welcomes to anyone joining us for our Wednesday sessions.

A big thank you to the wonderful volunteers Christina, Anna and Louise as well as everyone helping out with hospitality who are always kind, friendly and incredibly important in making mainly music a success.

Our thanks go to Anita and Brian for such a delightful afternoon, and for Sue Wiliams' team for rewarding our efforts with such well appreciated afternoon tea delights. Of special interest to our singers was singing Bishop Peter's lyrics of, "As we make the Pilgrim Journey", as Anita pointed out, appropriately to the tune 'Marching'.

Also on the programme was a favourite of Rev'd Kerry's, "I vow to thee my country", to Holst's Thaxted, which we had last sung during his farewell service in May. Under his encouragement our choir's favourite Māori hymn was "Tama Ngakau Marie", while "Whakaaria Mai" is perhaps the congregation's.

Many thanks to the faithful choral leadership provided regularly by our choral members, helped so much by Jeannette Wong's capable organisation of musical copy. They continue to provide a weekly 9:30am Communion hymn while I eagerly follow their singing, online. It was a joy to hear my choices sung so ably – and still feel 'included' as I heard Rev'd Louise's hymn choices using many of my weekly suggestions. We have continued to be blessed by Louise's musical confidence, competence, and wide knowledge of hymns, as well as her tunefulness over the microphone. Many thanks to the AV Team for

ASTA - ADVOCACY AT ST AIDAN'S

Jesus sent out his disciples, saying, 'As you go, proclaim this message: 'The kingdom of heaven has come near.' Heal the sick, raise the dead, cleanse those who have [skin diseases], drive out demons. Freely you have received; freely give. (Matthew 10:7-8)

The disciples were sent to announce good news and to demonstrate it in action. The sick could be healed, set free from restrictive ideas about sinfulness (which was then thought to explain sickness). The boundaries of life and death were rolled back. Untouchability, social barriers, would end. There was no reason to fear people who were different. The existing world order, the oppressive 'powers that be,' were to be challenged and overthrown.

And today... What would the coming kingdom of heaven look like in our day? What changes are needed, to let God be revealed? What assumptions should change, what fears eased, what powers in our world confronted?

Does such work sound like political or social activism? But this was what Jesus' work - and the disciples' work - sounded like, back then. Upsetting the status quo. Enough to get a man killed.

And who will do the work now? – Oh! If Jesus has touched our lives, <u>we</u> are sent out to be God's good news, God's work in the world.

This is the first report from ASTA. The group began as the Writing Group towards the end of 2022. Until the end of 2023 the group remained very small. End-of-year activities in both years drew interest within and from outside St Aidan's: each October we draw and write cards for people in NZ prisons, a project coordinated by the Prisoner Correspondence network, and in November we participate in Amnesty International's Write for Rights campaign. These campaigns were well supported in both years.

At the end of 2023, more St Aidan's people became keenly involved. Although we had to suspend activities for the first half of 2024, we restarted vigorously in July 2024.

The group has begun to draw in people from elsewhere, which is pleasing. Advocacy can be lonely, difficult work, and it helps to join others and share skills. So we are especially fortunate to have some experienced Amnesty members join us, after the Remuera Amnesty group closed this year: they are glad to have more people interested in the issues, and we have much to learn from them.

With the new burst of energy evident among us, we began to look for a name which better reflects what we are doing. We settled on ASTA, and a logo.

Since July 2024, we have written letters

- on the case of Idris Khattak, a Pakistani human rights defender and independent researcher, who was forcibly 'disappeared' for some months. In 2019-2020. When he 'reappeared' in custody, he was tried and sentenced in a military court, contrary to international norms for a civilian, and is still in jail
- in support of Maria Ressa, a courageous independent Filipina journalist and Nobel Peace Prize winner, who has been hounded by successive governments
- taking the government of Pakistan to task over failures to bring to justice people involved in (mainly anti-Christian) riots
- to Winston Peters, seeking support for an independent international accountability mechanism for Afghanistan – this in response to the disastrous human rights situation in that country, particularly affecting women and girls
- to the Hon Louise Upston, the Prime Minister and our local MP, seeking restored financial support for the Auckland City Mission (and similar bodies) for the provision of food to people in need.

In connection with the latter, two nervous advocates from among us attended a street corner meeting with the Hon David Seymour, at which we hand-delivered him a copy of our letter and raised the City Mission funding issue. His electorate office phoned us the following day. A well-researched reply was promised... we're still waiting (31/10/24) for this to arrive. Advocacy is taking us out of our comfort zone.

- In August we had a guest speaker, Cathy Bi-Riley, who spoke about Common Grace, a Christian advocacy group, and about how to make a submission on the Second Emissions Reduction Plan, NZ's plan to deal with our carbon emissions. Some submissions were produced.
- We have also produced 51 cards which will reach people in prisons this December. This is always fun work, drawing on our artistic skills!

We begin each session by lighting a candle and joining in a very brief reflection. After our work, we have morning tea, a chance to get to know one another and share ideas.

New members/visitors welcome! Our final session for this year is on Friday 29 November.

REMUERA CHRISTIANS TRUST BOARD

Main item to report this year is extensive renovation of the three bathrooms in the house. This was prompted by an audit from Te Whatu Ora the results of which were passed onto us by WALSH. The upshot was an agreement with WALSH that we would undertake the work and, in consideration of the considerable cost involved, WALSH would commit to a new lease. The existing lease had expired some time ago.

David Hunt from St Pauls, as usual, tackled the work with his typical efficiency. We had been given estimates of cost, and I understand only minor increases all *over* those estimates have actually been charged.

In return, WALSH has agreed to take up a new lease for a further three years with right of renewal for a further three years. A market rental valuation was obtained. The last valuation had been obtained many many years ago. There was a substantial increase but, again, we have allowed a discount of nearly 20% as a contribution by the Trust to WALSH operations.

Apart from the foregoing, WALSH continue to operate the house satisfactorily I'm also pleased to report that we have a full board of trustees, David Boswell having been appointed by St Lukes and Sharon Sweeney Lauder by Somervell. From my point of view, it's a considerable help to me to have board members available to assist when required.

Louise presented the Parish roll and explained that anyone on the parish roll are able to vote who are aged 16 and above.
